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Approval of the Agenda:

7. Discussion Items:

7.1 Recreation Programs Update - Phil Catanach, Recreation Services Deputy Director:

Phil Catanach stated he oversees aquatics, athletics, recreation programming, community events, and employee wellness. They provide programs and activities that build community, foster potential talent, release creativity, and improve physical wellbeing and create memorable experiences. The aquatic season for the summer goes from Memorial Day till Labor Day. Aquatics included the Regional Aquatic Center, the Natatorium, East Mesa Bataan Memorial, and Laabs outdoor pools, Mesa Verde and Unidad splash pads, and Plaza de Las Cruces interactive fountain. There are free swim days on Memorial Day, Father's Day, Fourth of July, and Labor Day. They have served over 70,000 patrons since May 25 which are counted via transactions with the cashier. There are more with swim teams, and groups that come and swim with a fee. Also does not included rentals, splash pad, or interactive fountain, as those get hundreds of people each day. There were 38 lifeguards and five head-lifeguards. Provided 12 swim lesson classes with 126 participants. Have eight students to one instructor per Red Cross.

Athletics. Provide leagues, sports sessions, open gym, and tournaments. Summer activities held at Meerscheidt Recreation Center, Ron Galla T-ball fields and Provencio/Van Dame soccer fields. Offer teen sessions Monday through Friday at Meerscheidt and each session had an average of 80 teens per day, and is very popular. Held adult basketball league, super fours sand and six by six grass volleyball tournaments, little sluggers T-ball league, youth outdoor soccer league, and indoor youth volleyball for grades 3-8. The championships are tonight and tomorrow for 6th and 7th grade. Had 8th grade this Saturday as part of the Las Cruces Public Schools and NMAA, which had

to be done by this Monday to participate in NMAA sports. Adult sessions for pickleball, basketball, volleyball, and fitness.

Recreation programs. Provide athletic, fitness, recreation, wellness, social, artistic, and family programming for the community. Activities include therapeutic activities for people with cognitive or physical disabilities, art classes, community events, and community outreach with mobile recreation unit. The recreation programs oversee Frank O'Brien Community Center and East Mesa Recreation Center, and also support community events. They helped provide summer food program at East Mesa Recreation Center, held Mother and Son dance, mobile unit events throughout the community which helps people who cannot get to the centers. Also have National Night Out, Lift Up Las Cruces, Kids Expo giving out school supplies and information.

Community events. Provide free family events for the community, encourages citizens of diverse backgrounds to socialize, network, and bond, and unites community pride and engages the community in a diverse set of events that a lot of people otherwise would not be able to participate in. Summer events were the Mayor's Jazz Fest, Music in the Park, Movies in the Park, Community Concerts, Electric Light Parade, 4th of July Concert and Fireworks. The 4th of July had about 8,000 to 10,000 on the field and reached over 25,000 with fireworks show.

Employee wellness. Provide recreational, fitness, sports opportunities, and help promote a balanced work life structure. Goal of the program is to decrease health costs including insurance cost, sick leave use, and unproductive work time. Also provide incentive and rewards for participation. Promote healthy life choices and support encouragement. Now part of the benefit package as an employee. Ziggy challenge was tracking stats on walking distance with prizes and started a new one in July. They have challenges of eight weeks for transform to lose body fat or gain muscle or stick to a challenge. Had water polo with inner tubes. Sat volleyball tournament next week. Basketball season for employees in September. Families can also participate, not just the employee.

The various programs are advertised on social media, along with radio and TV. Also the City just redid their webpage. Board Member Beard asked if putting info for Parks & Rec in the water bill. That is very expensive and not cost effective. They have tried to get information in all the backpacks of the students.

Board Member Beard asked about expanding the employee wellness to others, general public, but it is geared to employees. Aside from employee wellness Parks and Rec offers 21 different fitness classes which is 48 classes every week. And then senior programs offers another ten classes. Board Member Beard also mentioned a lack of pickleball courts. There are eight on

the East Mesa Sports Complex, eight at Apodaca Park, rehabbing Frenger tennis courts which will be additional four courts making that up to eight courts, and Meerscheidt Recreation Center have pickleball sessions every day, which are indoor. Board Member Beard mentioned other communities have courts that can do tennis and pickleball on the same court. Katherine Harrison-Rogers mentioned that they are looking for a site to have pickleball tournaments (24-32 courts average), which does take time and money.

7.2 Youth Services Program Update - Robert Nunez, Youth Services Deputy Director:

Robert Nunez stated the have out of school time programs including Keep Las Cruces Beautiful, Youth Development and Divergent Program. The summer recreation program include four sites in the City in conjunction with the public This program is approximately five weeks. There were 240 participants signed up. There were approximately 52 children per site. They have field trips, presenters come to the facilities, all providing a safe and constructive environment, kindergarten through fifth grade. They use City vans, public transportation, and Las Cruces Public School bus system to transport the children. Another program is A. Fielder Memorial Safe Haven the Weed and Seed program from a grant that started 23 years ago, weed out the bad, seed the good in the historic district at 906 N. Tornillo Street. This program moved to Parks and Rec in 2014. Average about 60 children per day. National Guard come to all their locations and do presentations, bring the climbing wall, obstacle courses. Teen connection, ages 12-18 offer programming which starts later in the day. Kinder through sixth children programs go from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., are provided breakfast and lunch during the day. The teenagers 10:00/11:00 a.m. given lunch and snacks. Teens do a lot of activities in the community. Partner with Friends of Organ Mountain and other biking organizations that assist. Teen programs are free. Kinder through fifth are \$100 for the summer or semester. They do community service throughout the City, all ages. Teen connection is housed at Frank O'Brien Papen Community Center. They go to approximately nine to ten schools to pick up youth, middle schools and high schools. During the summer average about 45 teens a day. This program goes 52 weeks of the year. Open majority of no school days.

Summer food program. Provided just over 19,000 meals this summer. The original nonprofit that they were doing this with declined this year and so had a bit of a late start. Partnered with Boys and Girls Club, NMSU, and other organizations that needed some meals and strategically placed them around the City. Las Cruces Public Schools also offered sites at their summer school/summer activity locations. The City does get reimbursed for a majority of the meals from ECECD through State of New Mexico at \$70,000 which was just almost fully reimbursed. They offered 12 locations and the public schools offered eight locations, anyone age one to 18 could get a free meal. Program

ended July 12th, and school started 22nd. The meals are prepped and Las Cruces High School, packaged in containers, and then coordinate to get the meals out. The City did this for 35 years, and then the nonprofit took it over in 2010, and now back to the City. They do nutritional educational programs for the youth in this program.

The Youth Development and Divergent program, the City just met with Las Cruces Public Schools and working closely to make sure seeing the formal referrals, informal referrals of youth ages 12-17 that need some assistance with making the right choices and not have stigma of juvenile. Recently notified, awarded and going through the process of getting signatures, from \$300,000 over the last four years to now at \$578,000 awarded from CYFD.

Board Member Bradley asked if the programs or athletics can be used on college applications as extracurricular activities. There are volunteer programs which they would be allowed to put in volunteer hours, and also working on near-peer program.

7.3 Metro Verde Twin Parks and Safe Haven Improvements - Katherine Harrison-Rogers, Parks Planning and Construction Administrator:

Katherine Harrison-Rogers stated there are a couple of projects completed. Safe Haven is one and also Twin Parks and recommended for renaming by PRAB to Ocotillo Park. It has not gone to Council for naming. Safe Haven has new playground and shade structures, and then also includes basketball courts, and other play areas. Play area is 2,300 square feet, and overall site is 6,000 square feet total. Play equipment includes slides, climbing features, and balance beam. This came from the general fund to replace the play equipment and shade structures, at about \$309,000.

Next Ocotillo Park. About an acre on each side of Stant Minerva in Metro Verde, Metro Central Phase 2. Nice grass areas, as requested by residents in the area. When created, rock surfacing, turf grass, a lot of perimeter trees, ADA walkways, bike rack, shad structures, pickup stations for pets, picnic tables, benches, and play equipment with engineered wood fiber surfacing, instead of rubber surfacing. Cornhole are concrete fixed structures the developer installed, minigolf course, and great chalk wall. The developer built this and was reimbursed via park impact fees, but generally the reimbursement is not the full spent on the build. In this case about \$350,000.

There are a lot of active projects now. She will be bringing a couple of every months of the newly completed ones. Highland Park is currently under construction. Veterans Park, expanding the parking lot and redoing the existing parking lot. Pioneer Park, replacing gazebo, improving walkways. Klein Park, some improvements, new mural, and replaced the roofing on the amphitheater and some painting and concrete improvements. Skate park is in

the middle of construction. East Mesa is a continuing project that is phased and will go on for several years. Just looked at 60% drawings of phase 2, which includes another skate park, sand volleyball courts, basketball courts, et al. The pickleball is open at the East Meas. It will have the grand opening on September 13th.

Board Member Bradley noted a lot of work and upgrades, but it does not seem there is a plan to shade all of the parks. Is there a reason not shading all the parks, particularly to save the equipment and better utilize the parks? Also no water, no bathrooms. Parks and Rec are trying to do a better job of addressing They are trying to do some of that with the replacements and this. improvements. The East Mesa in the early stages of playground design and will include ample shade. Chair Raish mentioned the pickleball and the shade. Katherine Harrison-Rogers mentioned the shade structures are on back order due in September. Not all parks are designed to have bathrooms. The larger parks, yes, the smaller neighborhood parks, in theory people live close enough nearby to use restrooms at home. Provencio/Van Dame is having bathrooms designed. Replacing the ones at Valley View and also Apodaca. Unidad park has one that "shows feet" and that seems to be well received overall, and was designed that way. Board Member Haas asked about the longevity of the shade materials. It is about 10 years, but Katherine will return with more information.

Katherine Harrison-Rogers stated she has an inquiry of the board if they would like to have park tours. Possibly East Mesa, segments of the City park tours. As this could entail a board quorum it would have to be coordinated and posted with the City Clerk.

Phil Catanach mentioned splash pads, Unidad, Metro Verde starting the 26th will be open Friday, Saturday, Sunday only as school has started and not getting as much use. Plaza Fountain will go until early October. This Sunday there is Music in the Park to celebrate Kool and Gang tribute band, and Lush and Lean Quartet. Tonight a concert at the Plaza.

Greg Shervanick stated in the Bulletin and some fliers stated Parks and Recreation

is the controller of all the trials, bicycle paths. The county is promoting a large safety

issue, county roads, City roads. Open house tomorrow at the county. Mentioned

 Vice-Chair Haas thanked for the presentations and the PowerPoints.
